## Background on World Day of Prayer (WDP)

The origins of World Day of Prayer date back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century when Christian women of the United States and Canada initiated a variety of cooperative activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world. Today, WDP is carried out by women in more than 170 countries and regions. WDP brings together people of various races, cultures and traditions in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year.

Each WDP worship service has a special theme and is prepared by a different country.

Through the preparation and participation in the annual WDP Worship Service, we come to know our sisters of other countries and understand the biblical passages in their own context. We hear their concerns and needs and feel ourselves in solidarity with them. In this way, it is possible to experience the richness of the Christian faith as it grows deeper and broader in an international, ecumenical expression.
